Swadhar IDWC Pune was established in 1995 as a branch of Swadhar Mumbai. Swadhar works towards empowerment of women and children. Women, world over and particularly in India, have always been denied their rightful position in a family as well as in the society. Making women aware of their rights is of vital importance if we wish to empower them. An empowered woman in turn will contribute to create a society where she is respected and her rights are protected. Swadhar began as a small effort by our founder late Prof. Meenakshi Apte with the able help of renowned social activist late Smt. Mrunal Gore

Scope of Swadhar's activities expanded when child empowerment related projects were also introduced. As the scope widened, Swadhar was registered as Swadhar IDWC (Institute for Development of Women and Children) in 1998. Since then, the institution has been working for the cause, adding more activities to address newer needs of women and children as they become evident.

Projects were instituted on Education, HIV – AIDs, Children in need of Care and Protection, Community Development and Vocational Training. Among all the projects, Mohor is one of the projects instituted for children in need of care and protection. Our efforts are yielding excellent results as seen by the ever-increasing number of women and children who are leading a self-reliant and dignified life as a result of their association with Swadhar.

## Vision, Mission, Goal and Objectives

#### Vision:

Swadhar IDWC envisions a society wherein women in distress and underprivileged children are empowered to uplift themselves and become responsible members of our society.

#### Mission:

Swadhar IDWC seeks to help and empower women in distress along with a focus on the holistic development of underprivileged children. Our aim is to improve the quality of life of individuals and families through education, guidance, training and counselling.

# **Objective**

- To help, guide and counsel women in physical and emotional distress or need. Providing them legal, economic, medical and emotional support. Also provide them the guidance and counselling that would help them become self-reliant.
- To create awareness among women about how family life and their relationships should be. Making them aware of their rights, about their rightful place in their own families and the society at large, and about the importance of creating an identity for themselves.
- To provide support to children who are in need of care and protection, and thereby ensure their survival, well-being and development.
- To provide support for overall development of children with special support to girl child. Extending any required financial assistance; needed counselling and emotional support; making provisions for trainings and vocational guidance and creating awareness of their rights and responsibilities.
- To ensure equitable access to learning opportunities, improved learning outcomes and skills for holistic development of underprivileged children from early childhood until 18 yrs.

Some post covid measures include helping women and families traumatised by emotional, social and financial sufferings. The focus will be on preparing them to avail of the benefits under various government schemes, launching focussed programs in community school classes to address the loss of learning in children due to intermittent school closures, building digital literacy of the staff including use of digital knowledge.

A participatory approach in all our activities will enable stakeholders like parents, community and staff to have an equal role.

We will be implementing the strategic plan of the organisation, which was structured in 2020 but was put on a back burner because of the on-going restrictions. As a part of this, we will make sub committees vibrant and more participative in running the projects.

Collaborating and networking with other organisations for greater outreach, documenting and encouraging evidence-based research from our data rich projects like Rays of Hope and Mohor is also on the cards. Our experts within the managing committee will help in this endeavour.

New and young members with experience have already started with capacity building sessions for staff in fields of family counselling.

To keep pace with the changing statutory requirements and new compliances, office bearers are streamlining the existing systems of accounting including payroll.

Our immediate plan is to have an advisory panel which is also in process.

The tasks are numerous, the team is motivated, the support of donors and well-wishers will help us realise our goals.

Women are denied their rightful position in the family and in our society. Want of education and economic dependence are majorly responsible for this situation. Families need to realise the importance of educating their daughters either through formal/vocational education or life skill training. As educated, empowered and earning girls their decisions will be valued at home and in their work place.

In India, the participation of women in the workforce is just 19% which is considerably low as compared to other developing countries. Only education can change this.

We promote education to young girls and provide skills that help them have independent earnings. In addition, we help improve their awareness about relevant issues and develop their life skills as we include awareness generation sessions in our programs.

We intend to help women in distress. Women empowerment and welfare has always been our focus while designing interventions.

# Rationale behind starting the project:

Family Counselling is the best strategy to resolve family conflicts, discourage families from breaking and help women secure their rightful place in the family. With changing times, now men and children have come within our ambit. Our counselling centres are now spread over Pune and Pimpri Chinchwad areas. Swadhar IDWC Family Counselling Center is the only counselling center approved by Central Social Welfare Board in Pune district.

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

#### Challenges:

- 1. Insufficient funds, limited provision of legal help
- 2. We began tele-counselling during the pandemic but several women clients did not have their own phone sets. Also, unstable net connectivity at either end proved a hinderance.
- 3. Lack of privacy to share their problem with the counsellor.
- 4. Insensitivity of the police towards cases of domestic violence.

#### Strategies:

- Training staff to sensitize police in dealing with women.
- Training and skill upgradation of counsellors.
- Approaching communities where Swadhar IDWC has a presence as well as a few unreached communities.

## Achievements in the last one year:

- During lockdown, we telephonically registered cases and realised that most pertained to domestic violence. As a logical extension of this, our social workers organised a webinar on 'Family Crisis and Counselling in The Context of Corona Pandemic Situation'. Two hundred people participated from all over Maharashtra.
- Children staying indoors 24\*7 resulted in increased usage of mobile phones creating different set of problems among them. In our effort to reduce these, we conducted a community level session on 'Love-Friendship-Attraction'. Four sessions were organized on this topic, in which around 100 members participated.

#### Success story:

Manisha (name changed) came to our family counselling center complaining about physical and mental harassment at the hands of her husband, mother-in-law and sister-in-law. After noting her case history, individual counselling was done and her husband and mother-in-law were contacted and called to the family counselling center. Couple counselling was done. Joint meeting was held with Manisha, her husband, mother-in-law, sister-in-law and other relatives. A police station visit was undertaken with Manisha and her husband as both had filed separate police complaints against each other.

After counselling, in presence of the police both husband and wife agreed to stay together and withdrew the police complaint filed against each other. A mutual consent letter was signed on the letter head of Swadhar IDWC by both of them. Thereafter, they are staying happily together which got confirmed during surprise follow up home visits. The case is now closed.

# Rationale behind starting the project:

In poor families, girls suffer disproportionately when compared to boys and are deprived of the education that they aspire for. This results in disparity and a difference in the way they are perceived at home, as compared to their male siblings. Subsequently this creates gender inequality where job opportunities are concerned. This program believes in using education as a tool to reduce this gap.

We have seen that educating girls goes a long way in not only building their self-confidence but also in boosting their overall quality of life. This way they are able to stand for their rights, resist early non-consensual marriages, choose their partner wisely, plan parenthood, resist violence, engage in meaningful employment, and lead a constructive and meaningful life, while giving back to the society. They will insist on educating their children thereby increasing the educated population.

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

Delayed beginning - Schools reopened in June with online classes. In this new way of teaching and learning the teachers and students were better prepared than during the first wave of COVID 19 pandemic. Some families could not afford a smartphone so their children lagged behind, while those with the device fared well. Quality of connectivity was another issue not just for school children but for all others too.

To be able to attend online classes, to submit assignments and appear for interviews, we included internet recharge expenses in our support to lessen this burden on the family.

Results of Secondary and Higher secondary school examinations were delayed by three months, that is by August and July respectively. The admission process for subsequent courses being centralized, the process was completed in November 2021.

#### Disrupted schedule

For reasons mentioned above the regular schedule was disrupted for everyone.

But there was a huge disruption mainly for the students of Nursing. They completed their examinations in October/November 2021. However, most of these students are yet to receive their results.

Though they did start with classes of the subsequent year, their fees were declared late and most have not been able to pay even a small part of it. To expand our outreach, we networked with other organizations and trusts and fortunately most have shown their willingness to support our girls.

#### Achievements in the last one year:

Home/ hostel visits (that form the basis to gauge suitability of girls) which were done in person during normal times were conducted virtually this year. This way, we are able to get a better understanding of the girls, their families and their requirements. To our advantage we could also talk to their parents and siblings.

Online meetings with beneficiaries were held with students of Nursing and those who are extended full educational support.

To enable girls to improve on their English, we held online lectures in English language conducted by an external resource. These classes helped a large number of girls to overcome their inhibitions and become more familiar with the language.

Session on Career for final year students to make them future ready to join the work force was conducted by our then HR manager Ms. Aparna Gonate. She guided them on 'How to prepare for job interviews.

In June 2021, we provided dry grocery kits to 35 most needy families, we were touched to hear of their struggles and their dire situation. These kits were funded by Give India.

To make good use of the free time (period of uncertainty), we visited various schools and educational institutes

which were previously in the taluka but are now within the newly included areas in Pune Municipal Corporations to reach out to more needy girls.

One of our students, who is now an employee of HDFC bank, donated to the project.

Educational materials such as notebooks, geometry boxes, graph books, etc. were distributed to needy girls of schools supported by Girls Education Support Program.



## Success story:

#### Simple living, high thinking

Fiza, presently a student of third year of Computer Engineering has secured an internship at a leading American multinational and technological company that focusses on e-commerce. She hopes to pay her final year fees from the stipend that she will receive. She personally visited our office to convey the same.

Swadhar IDWC has been supporting her education from the time she was in school. Her inability to clear the CET after class 12 in the first attempt did not deter her. Instead, she took one year's break, worked hard and cracked the test next year. Thereafter there was no looking back. Fiza comes from a modest family background, wherein a space of one and a half rooms is shared by six family members. The whole family understands the importance of education and hence supports her. "Simple living and high thinking" seems to be their motto.

#### Rationale behind starting the project:

To impart vocational and life skill education to school drop outs and young mothers and inspire them to become self-reliant, confident and aware of their surroundings. Presently, the number of school dropouts has reduced but there is increasing number of mothers who approach us for acquiring vocational training or learning entrepreneurial skills in a bid to become earning members of their families

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

High concentration of Covid-19 patients restricted our movement in the settlements as also reaching out to our beneficiaries. Overcoming all this, we identified needy girls in the localities. We initially explained the importance of financial self-reliance which they could attain by enrolling for vocational/ business training. This appealed to them as their financial condition had deteriorated as a result of long period and intermittent lock down and restriction on movement

#### Achievements in the last one year:

A total of 5 girls and 15 women qualified for the International Makeup Artist Diploma examination. Of them 4 girls and 6 women have successfully completed the course. Presently 1 girl and 9 women are still undergoing training. Noteworthy amongst them is Prajakta Pawar who has started her own parlor in Bibvewadi.

#### Success story:

Deepali Shirke: an orphan under foster care of her relative was married off very early. She is a beneficiary of Phulora project Bibvewadi from 2013. A school dropout, we encouraged her to appear for the 10th standard examination. She successfully completed SSC and later 12th standard and went on to complete B. Com. She also completed our sewing and beauty parlour courses. Being interested in becoming financially independent, she cracked the police recruitment examination. She is presently posted as a constable at the Shivajinagar head office. Hats off to her!! She is now a role model for young and aspiring girls.

# Rationale behind starting the project:

To impart vocational and life skill education to school drop outs and young mothers and inspire them to become self-reliant, confident and aware of their surroundings. This center is replicated from Phulora at PMC While taking classes in the locality, we realized that life skill sessions would be more useful for adolescent girls and so extended our intervention to schools for girls of class 7 and 8.

# Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

- Due to pandemic situation children could not come to school and neither could we reach them. How to reach out to them
  was a big challenge. To overcome this, our teachers created videos on most of the subjects and forwarded them to the
  children through the schools. Sessions that needed to be conducted offline like menstruation and dealing with period of
  adolescence were held in person This exercise helped our teachers and also those from schools to become capable of
  making good videos and short clips with appropriate pictures.
- On account of social distancing and intermittent restriction on movement, we restricted the number of girls to ten per batch for both beauty parlors and baking classes.



### Achievements in the last one year:

As mentioned above we could not go to school to conduct session. Our teachers learnt to make videos on various sessions to the benefit of children of class 7 and 8. We went bilingual and created videos in Marathi and Hindi to the benefit of Hindi and Urdu medium schools. Videos of public hygiene, personal hygiene and self-protection were also sent to the students of class 5 and 6. Those on public and personal hygiene and self-protection were also sent to the students. These videos had wide viewership as the children and their parents and others in the house viewed and shared them. Few of our vocational training beneficiaries started earning money by taking orders for cakes while those who took beauty parlor classes could earn by doing facial and other treatment independently. This has boosted their self-confidence. Will the women take a sewing class now? And when? They have started coming to the centre and inquiring about it.

#### Success story:

# Such is our baking queen Kanchan

She came, she saw, and she won. Kanchan joined our baking classes in Morya Housing Society. She was sightly hesitant initially (because she had not held a pen in her hand in a long time) whether she would be able to complete the class successfully. But her hard work and curiosity got the better of her and she started getting all her doubts cleared. She also became adept in time management, finished her household chores and attended the classes on time regularly. The initial resistance from her family waned when she baked a cake at home. She practiced cake making and came well prepared for the exams with a Chocolate Dutch cream cake packed in a suitable box for which all ingredients were bought from her own earnings. Needless to say, she stood first in the exams and now accepts orders for different types of cakes. Like her, all-other participants now earn money through making and selling cakes.

# Children in special need of Care and Protection

We added childcare and protection under our umbrella to justify the name Swadhar IDWC (Institute for Development of Women and Children).

We began working towards the education, protection, care and overall development of disadvantaged and underserved children with special emphasis on girl-child. Every child requires a safe, clean and fun place to grow to create a positive impact on their minds.

We work in this direction and address these needs. Two of our projects focus on children who are vulnerable: Mohor through its shelter home takes care of children of sex workers and Rays of Hope (from 2005) looks after children who are affected or infected with HIV/AIDS- Here we include children between 0 to 18 years of age.

We cover child rights and provide children with shelter, food, education, better health care.



# A. Project Mohor

Year it was started - 1997 Total staff strength - 12

## Rationale behind starting the Project -

- 1) To help children in need of survival, care, protection and development.
- To understand the magnitude of child vulnerability as a result of their mothers' profession.
- To understand the need of these children in order to create relevant and evidence-based intervention.
- 4) To prevent second generation prostitution by defending their rights and dignity.
- 5) To provide gender specific services to girl child through specialized knowledge, vocational counselling and awareness of their rights.
- To ensure long term care, rehabilitation and repatriation to break the cycle of exploitation.
- To take initiatives to change society-wide perception about these children.

## Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

# Challenges:

The pandemic resulted in fund crunch. Restriction on the movement of staff was a road block while infrastructure maintenance had come to a halt. The area was often cordoned off by the authorities

# Strategies:

- Grocery kits were distributed to the residents of the red-light area as they had neither money nor access to food. Oxygen cylinders and concentrators (received as donations), masks, cleaning material were provided to general public, Govt. Hospital and Covid centers.
- Cooked food was provided to homeless and residents of Budhwar Peth.
- Education Material and toys were provided to children
- Infants were given eggs and milk.

### Achievements in the last one year:

In spite of lock down, the staff was permitted to enter the locality which enabled provision of groceries, medical help, education material and counseling. We could also continue our efforts in rescuing children and arresting child marriages. Several of our team members received awards for their efforts.

#### Success story:

Hailing from Karnataka, Mala a mother of two daughters, is a sex worker at Budhwar Peth for many years. Both daughters stay at our 24-hour residential facility. One of them, Renu, (who had a troubled childhood) was inclined towards academics. Our team members counselled Maya to allow Renu to complete her school education. During her stay at our project, she completed up to 7th standard successfully.

Renu, an attractive adolescent, was constantly eyed by bad elements and visitors to the community. To protect her was a big challenge. School teachers joined hands with us and together we found a donor who would sponsor her fees and hostel facilities at a renowned residential school in Pune. Here she completed her studies from class 8 to 10 and passed with flying colours. This year, she has completed class 12 successfully and has enrolled for a computer course (MSCIT). She wishes to complete her graduation and after turning 18, she will explore opportunities to work part time based on the knowledge gained from her computer course and generate some income. If the need arises, Swadhar IDWC Mohor is willing to sponsor any advanced courses which she would like to pursue.

The environment and the extremely insulting behaviour have left an indelible mark deep down on all three of them. Renu is determined to be financially independent and move out of the red-light area along with her mother and sister at the first opportunity.

# **B. Project Rays of Hope**

Year it was started - 2005 Total staff strength - 4

#### Rationale behind starting the project

Around 2002 to date, HIV/AIDS is considered to be a solely sexually transmitted disease. Those either infected or affected are stigmatised and marginalised with little acceptance from families, friends or our society. Our aim is to provide care and protection to such children and their families. Children under this project are from economically underprivileged strata of society and the chances of them facing starvation are alarmingly high. One of the ways to counter this condition and help them to lead a normal healthy life is to lessen their starvation by ensuring that they are properly fed.

With this in mind the project has been providing protein rich groceries and nutritional supplements on a regular/ monthly basis. This has helped them to cope with their health condition in a better manner.

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

#### Challenges:

- Reaching out to the beneficiaries was difficult mainly those from rural areas because of low or no connectivity.
- Beneficiaries could not reach Anti-Retroviral Treatment (ART) centre due to intermittent lock down
- Interruptions in online guidance due to unstable connectivity at either end

# Strategies to overcome the Challenges

- Our individual donors transferred Rs 2000/- to individual bank accounts through NEFT. On our part we transferred Rs.1100/- per month for food grains
- We contacted ART centres and beneficiaries by phone.
- Beneficiaries in rural areas were contacted with the help of local social worker
- Coupons method adopted.

# Achievements in the last one year:

A total of 22 children whose parents succumbed to Covid 19 get Rs. 1100.00 per month through NEFT from foster care scheme, Department of women and child welfare. In addition, we offer help in various other ways. All these children are from rural areas.



### **Success Story**

Background: A severely malnourished and HIV/AIDS infected Chaitanya came to us when he was 14 years old and was studying in class 8. He has one elder sister who is also infected with HIV/AIDS. Both their health parameters were worrisome. Their mother succumbed to AIDS when Chaitanya was only three years old. He has another elder sister who is not infected. She and the father take care of this family of four.


Intervention: After home visit it was noticed that Chaitnya needed support for almost everything. A grocery set, nutritional supplement, medical help and educational aid were started immediately. Concentrated counselling was done for the entire family to tide over their acute depression and face society with courage.

Impact: After four years of relentless efforts, health parameters of Chaitanya and his sister showed improvement. Chaitainya went on to pass the 10th Board exam and class 12 examination securing 78% marks. All this in spite of Covid 19 pandemic and dealing with online education. Now Chaitanya has a part time job and continues with his education. He wishes to complete B, Com and dreams of becoming a bank officer. The social workers have shown him that there is a Ray of Hope at the end of the tunnel.

# Overall Development of the Children & Community

Through multiple projects Swadhar IDWC has been focusing on the overall development of children. Here we include children between 0 to 18 years of age. Our first attempt was to mainstream the out-of-school children. As per the Right to Education act, they would be admitted to the class considering their age and not their levels of understanding. As a result, many used to drop out again since they could not keep up with the pace and content delivered to them in schools. In order to bring the out-of-school children to the age-appropriate level of understanding, we started our bridge classes (now called as Support Classes). We teach foundational literacy and numeracy in these classes to strengthen language skills and build up their logical aptitude respectively. Elder children in the community do not have access to the basic facilities, such as a quiet, clean and well-lit room to study, curricular and extra-curricular books, etc. In spite of being genuinely interested in studies, they were not able to perform well academically due to lack of facilities. We started Study Centers/Abhyasika for these children and provided them with the required facilities.

Educationists world over have suggested that the pre-schooling years have a great role to play in academic performance of the children. We, therefore, started Balwadis (Kindergartens) in many communities where we admit children between age 3 to 6. The academic performance of children depends on the stimulation they get very early in life and this even includes months before birth. Pre-birth to 8 years is a crucial period in the life of a child as far as brain development is concerned. In order to address this issue, we started Early Childhood Care, Development and Education program. Under this program we work with pregnant and lactating mothers, Fathers, Grandparent and make them aware about the importance of mother's health prior to and during pregnancy, role of stimuli in brain development, better parenting practices, hygiene, nutrition and vaccination.

We run libraries in the community for children. In addition, as an attempt to improve their language skills, we run a Reading Class Project with PMC / PCMC as well as private schools. This project has activities designed to strengthen the language (Marathi) and inculcate the habit of reading.

With the changing times, we are also trying to introduce children to computer use. We conduct E-learning classes at multiple locations.

# Rationale behind starting the project -:

In 1998, Akshardeep was conceived by Swadhar IDWC with the intention of achieving inclusive and quality education for all children from 6 to 14 years. Today, this is a United Nations Sustainable Development Goal No.4 because education is one of the most powerful and proven vehicles for sustainable development. The three-pronged approach used by us is

- 1. Participation of parents in the overall development of their children.
- 2. Creating a flexible and inclusive system to reach all of them and
- 3. Retaining them once they are in the system. Methodologies for these three have evolved to become more effective over these 24 years.

We believe in strengthening existing systems which resulted in Project Chetana, a unique initiative undertaken in collaboration with three other NGOs which aims at strengthening the PMC pre-school education system through intervention in 60 schools and handholding support so that PMC shoulders the responsibility of continuation.

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

Covid-19 caused behavioral changes in children along with loss of learning. Having been at home for two years with an access to a mobile phone constantly, behavioral changes were seen in children such as inability to concentrate on given task, tendency to get distracted easily and premature sexual behaviour. When these changes were noticed, we organized counseling, activities for socio-emotional development and group sessions for the children.

It was becoming difficult to reach children in the age group of 3 to 6 due to Covid related restrictions. For this, the organization implemented the initiative 'Parents become teachers' in which teachers introduced activities important for the development of their children and parents conducted them for their children. So even during these difficult times, we were able to reach out to these children through their parents. Also, when the Balwadi / Kindergarten classes were started in person, we took sessions with children for reading, writing and math to get them school ready.

It was a challenge to keep in touch with preschool children of 3-6 years using only the mobile phone. These children were isolated and in great need of socialization and stimulation. Their parents and family were their only means of receiving such inputs.

The team came up with innovative ways to stay connected with the caregivers of these children through What's App. Sessions included activities for child development using available material in keeping the children entertained and involved during lockdown.

## Achievements in the last one year:

- 1. 16 staff members from Project Akshardeep have completed government certified Balwadi course.
- 2. Upgradation of our Teaching Learning Material kit.
- 3. Parents participation in each activity as Aksharmitra, Palakmitra was remarkable.
- 4. Training provided to other organization - Aadhar Samajik Sanstha, Econet.
- 5. Co-creation of TLM kit in Waghari language.
- 6. International Day of Girl Child video made by Indian Breves with participation of 45 Swadhar IDWC beneficiary children of all projects.
- Various initiatives were implemented with other organization / network like Children's Manifesto, Slam out Loud 7. activity for socio emotional development.
- Financial support to 10 children for their higher education form nomadic community. 8.
- 9. 139 children enrolled in school with the help of Palakmitra.

#### Success story:

Vicky Prajapati: an honest and smart boy is a student of our e-learning class. His family consisting of his parents, two sisters and one brother, stay in the hutments. He completed first year Diploma in Civil Engineering and stood third. He is currently pursuing second year. Swadhar IDWC has helped him to pay his college fees.

Vicky believes in giving back to Swadhar IDWC, he comes to teach children in the e-learning class. He also helps as a volunteer in all the programs of the organization. Vicky's three siblings are attending our e-learning classes.

#### Rationale behind starting the project:

Swadhar IDWC contributes towards improving the quality of education in corporation schools. As a result, the Reading Class Project was adopted to make learning joyful by providing age-appropriate story books during their school timings.

The Reading Class Project was implemented with the main objective of providing interesting storybooks, songs stories, word puzzles and word games to the children studying in Std. I to IV in order to enhance their reading and comprehension skills. This project extended to Pimpri Chinchwad area in the year 2007.

# Challenges faced in the last year due to Covid 19:

With schools closed due to the pandemic, it was a challenge to stay connected with the children and teachers. The field team had to learn to use digital medium, create content of audio video material under difficult circumstances at home, keep records and follow up with teachers whilst facing connectivity issues.

# New strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

Our supervisory staff trained the team on how to use digital platforms, how to create digital content. Based on the previous years' experience, we could send children and teachers Audio/Videos of songs, stories, word games and some academic subjects like mathematics, science, history and environmental studies.

Our big achievement was that we could reach out to such a large number of beneficiaries-(Online July to March 31st)

# Rationale behind starting the project:

It was necessary to bring all our interventions under one roof for the empowerment of families as a unit thereby encompassing and addressing all needs of families staying in that community.

Bibvewadi was chosen and a family centric program designed accordingly.

This community was preferred because of Swadhar IDWC's long term presence there. A family centric program was designed considering our knowledge about the legal, financial, health and relationship related problems commonly faced by the families in this community. All activities are aimed to address the needs of almost all the age groups. However, while doing so, we did not lose our focus on women and children.

The project operates out of three community centres where activities like Kindergarten, Support classes, Study classes, Library, Vocational Training, E-learning and activities related to early childhood development and awareness generation programs are conducted.

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

Like all over, education in the community suffered a major setback during the pandemic. Children were unable to go to school and lost their habit of staying away from home, studying, and forgot many basics of education. They showed behavioural changes along with loss of learning, inability to focus on tasks and were distracted. Group sessions were organized to address their behavioural changes.

Younger children who turned three during the pandemic lost their chance of going to kindergarten. This has affected their learning abilities and social skills thereby impacting their academic performance.

The members of the staff continued their efforts to keep the children connected with their studies through online activities. Counselling and sessions for socio-emotional development continued.

Online interaction has now become routine strategy for our educational interventions. Our community-based interventions also employed online mode of communication.

The long-term pandemic has emphasised the need to help families so that children do not fall out of mainstream education. Their employment opportunities shrunk resulting in financial problems. To add to this many families faced medical, financial and emotional challenges. It became relevant that women take up jobs to support families. Proactive calls from HoS staff helped many families in coping with this traumatic situation. Our field staff went ahead that extra mile to make an impact.

### Success story:

RJ has completed studies till 12th while her husband has completed S.Y.B.A. He earns around Rs. 10,000/- PM. RJ showed interest in vocational training and completed the basic tailoring class with us about four years ago. By now she has developed good tailoring skills, hence Swadhar IDWC's FGP provided her with information and helped her in procuring required documents so that she could get government subsidy to buy a sewing machine. This helped her to start independent tailoring services and contribute towards family expenses

RJ was in constant touch with Swadhar IDWC staff who later informed her about vacancy as an 'ASHA' worker post of the Pune Municipal Corporation (PMC). She completed their training and is now working as 'ASHA' worker with a salary of around Rs. 9000/-PM

She was felicitated by the Health Department of PMC for her work during the COVID 19 lockdown period.

On the emotional front, RJ was often depressed because she has no children. However, with regular guidance and help by FGP staff she has started taking a positive view of her situation. RJ has now become confident, independent and is living her life in a very positive way.

#### Rationale behind starting the project:

To bring all projects of Swadhar IDWC under one roof. For this Kakade Basti was chosen because it lacks all the basic facilities i.e., there is no physical facility like school, health center, vegetable market, transport facilities etc. near the settlement. The proportion of school dropouts is also high.

#### Challenges faced in the last year and strategies employed to overcome the challenges:

For most period of the pandemic, the area was sealed because of high incidences of Covid-19. Hence reaching out to our beneficiaries became difficult. One of our teachers had contact numbers of few children. Through them we could get in touch with other needy children. With their help we formed a Youth Committee to reach out to more needy children One of our support class teachers lives in the same settlement. She supplied groceries and masks to the needy people with the help of local Corporators. She also provided books to the needy children from her library and solved difficulties faced by the children in their studies. In short, she did not allow a single child to starve or face any trouble.

#### Achievements in the last one year:

We were able to take care of the health of the children even during the Covid period. Four girls studying in the Phulora class benefitted from the online nursing course. Out of them, Anjum Shaikh, won the award of Covid Warrior by working for a Covid patient in Sassoon Hospital. During school closure, children had forgotten to read and write, but as soon as the classes resumed, the teachers again prepared them in reading and writing

#### Success story:

Sneha Kamble and Chhaya Waghmare, who had completed tailoring course in our class, had studied only up to class 9. They were interested in studying further but it was almost 20 years since they left school. We encouraged them to regain their confidence and helped them to get admission to the 10th standard class in an institution. We hope that they have scored well in their examination.
